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ICAN Nobel Peace Ride To urge Government to sign the UN Ban-the-bomb Treaty



In September 2018, we will journey from Melbourne to Canberra by bicycle, touring our Nobel Peace Prize medal and raising awareness of the new UN Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons. Beginning on September 2 in Melbourne, the birthplace of ICAN, we will arrive in Canberra on September 20, marking one year since the nuclear ban treaty opened for signature and demanding our Government join this landmark accord as a matter of urgency. The adventure culminates in a ride, rally and march on September 20 calling for Australia to sign and ratify the nuclear weapon ban treaty on the one-year anniversary of it opening for signature. Local cyclists are invited to join the final 5km "bridge to bridge" cycling leg. Everyone is invited to join the march and rally from the Canberra Peace Bell to Parliament House!

MUA says No to Nuclear Ports in South Australia

The Maritime Union of Australia (MUA) is continuing its long-running stance against the shipping of any nuclear material in or out of South Australia.

The Turnbull Government has shortlisted three sites in South Australia that could be used to permanently hold low-level nuclear waste and temporarily store intermediate-level waste.

Two of these sites are at Kimba, on the Eyre Peninsula, while a third is near Hawker, in the northern Flinders Ranges.

Whyalla, Port Lincoln and Port Pirie were named as potential nuclear waste ports in three "Site Characterisation, Technical Reports" released by the Federal Department of Industry in July.

Joel Lindsay, president of United Nations Young Professionals Qld addressed the threat of nuclear weapons from the Australian government's perspective.

He outlined he argument that nuclear-armed states and the strategic security alliance provided security for Australia.

In response, Dr Sue Wareham, one of the founding members of ICAN spoke on the importance of the Treaty to Prohibit Nuclear Weapons n(TPNW) brought into effect at the United Nations General Assembly in 2017 as a tool to exert pressure on countries with nuclear weapons or countries that might be thinking of acquiring them. She also emphasised the value and power of both individual and collective action.

North and South Korea have agreed to hold a summit of their leaders in Pyongyang to discuss "practical measures" to realise denuclearisation of the Korean peninsula.

Kim Jong-un will meet the South's President Moon Jae-in at a summit in Pyongyang in September to discuss nuclear disarmament, Seoul said Thursday. This would be the third meeting this year between the two leaders, who will discuss "practical measures to denuclearise" the flashpoint peninsula during the September 18-20 summit, South Korean National Security Advisor Chung Eui-yong told reporters.

Danger of breakout of US-Russia hostilities as Syrian government ousts last stronghold of rebel-terrorist resistance in Idlib

WASHINGTON (Reuters) - U.S. President Donald Trump on Monday warned Syrian President Bashar al-Assad and his allies Iran and Russia not to "recklessly attack" Syria's rebel-held Idlib province, warning that hundreds of thousands of people could be killed.

A source has told Reuters that Assad is preparing a phased offensive to regain Idlib. The northern province and surrounding areas are the last major enclave held by insurgents fighting Assad.

U.S. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo on Friday said Washington

U.S. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo on Friday said Washington views any government assault on Idlib as an escalation of Syria's war, and the State Department warned that Washington would respond to any chemical attack by Damascus.

Meantime up to 13 Russian warships have crossed the Bosphorus toward Syria so far this week as tensions between the U.S. and Syria continue to rise

The "Information Clearing House" reports on 28th Aug, the Russian Ministry of Defence said on Monday it had noticed Washington was building up its military forces in the Middle East in preparation for what Moscow feared was a possible strike on Syrian government forces, Russian news agencies reported.

Major-General Igor Konashenkov was quoted by agencies as saying that the USS Ross, a guided-missile destroyer, had entered the Mediterranean on Aug. 25 armed with 28 Tomahawk cruise missiles capable of hitting any target in Syria.

The deployment of the Russian fleet comes as the U.S. President Donald Trump threatened to strike the Syrian Army ahead of the longawaited battle of Idlib. Syria,

Australia and New Zealand will deploy aircraft to assist in the enforcement of sanctions against North Korea

Australia and New Zealand said sanctions their governments were deploying three maritime patrol aircraft to Japan to assist with efforts to enforce United Nations sanctions against North Korea.

Australia will add two AP-3C Orion maritime patrol aircraft to conduct maritime surveillance to an existing aircraft deployed earlier in the year, Defence Minister Christopher Pyne said in a statement.

A baby borne in Williamstown with 40 times the safe level of the PFAS contaminants in its blood, a property owner issued with a bank foreclosure notice after being unable to rent or sell her farm and the uncovering of a potential cancer cluster along Cabbage Tree Rd at Williamstown, all resulting from the leaking of PFAS contaminants from the RAAF base.

For the residents, it has been a political war of attrition to try and prise the required financial assistance from the federal government to clean up its own contamination leaching from the Williamstown RAAF base and compensate affected residents, a battle that has been going on for three years.

The Ten Principles of Bandung

Could they be good starting principles for an Independent Australian Foreign Policy?

in April 1955, the heads of state of 29 Asian and African countries, many of them newly independent, gathered in Bandung, Indonesia, to chart a course for peaceful co-existence and mutual respect between all nations. At the end of the Conference, the delegates issued a tenpoint declaration known as The Ten Principles of Bandung. They are:

- Respect for fundamental human rights and for the purpose and principles of the Charter of the United Nations;
- 2. Respect for the sovereignty and territorial integrity of all countries,
- 3. Recognise the equality of all races and the equality of all nations.
- 4. Non-intervention in the internal affairs of other countries,
- 5. Respect for the right of each nation to defend itself singly or collectively, in conformity with the Charter of the United Nations.
- 6. (a) Abstention from the use of arrangements of collective defence to serve any particular interests of the big powers.
 - (b) Abstention by any countries from exerting pressure on other countries
- Refraining from acts or threats of aggression or the use of force against the territorial integrity or political independence of any countries

- 8. Settlement of all international disputes by peaceful means, such as negotiation, conciliation, arbitration or judicial settlement as well as other peaceful means of the parties' own choice, in conformity with the Charter of the United Nations.
- 9. Promotion for mutual interest and cooperation
- 10. Respect for justice and international obligations

VISIT TO ACT BY JOSEPH GERSON

Joseph Gerson, who leads the Disarmament Program at the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC), visited Canberra from 12-14 August 2018 as guest of the Independent and Peace Australia Network (IPAN), Canberra Quakers, and the Sydney Hiroshima Committee. His Australian trip followed attendance at an anti-nuclear conference in Japan. He has experience over many years in the peace movement, and is currently the Vice-President of the International Peace Bureau and President of the Campaign for Peace, Disarmament and Common Security.

On 13 August Joseph met with ALP Senator Lisa Singh, Greens Senators Peter Whish-Wilson and Janet Rice, and ALP MP Sharon Claydon, and several staff/advisers at Parliament House. He supported their efforts to get Australia to change its position, and to sign and ratify the Nuclear Weapons Ban Treaty passed by the UN in 2017 by a large majority (122 nations). He stressed the critical importance of reversing the nuclear arms race at a time when threats

to use nuclear weapons are greater than ever.

Caspian Sea Agreement may show the way to solve the South China Sea disputes

On 12 August 2018 the five littoral states to the Caspian Sea (Azerbaijan, Iran, Kazakhstan, Russia and Turkmenistan) signed an historic agreement governing the use of the Caspian Sea. The negotiations had been ongoing for more than 20 years.

.

Although there are important differences between the Caspian Sea and the South China Sea, there are also lessons that can be drawn. Following the recent ASEAN meeting in Singapore, the ASEAN nations and China announced that they had agreed upon a new draft code of conduct for the littoral States of the South China Sea. Those negotiations had also been very lengthy.

The draft code of conduct underscores the importance of those nations most affected by the issues in dispute being the ones best able to formulate a resolution when they are able to do so. Those negotiations arguably have a better chance of success, absent the involvement of outside countries such as the United States and Australia. The actions and statements of those two nations demonstrate an inability to promote a peaceful resolution of the South China Sea issues, preferring instead a provocative and confrontational methodology.

The Caspian Sea Convention and the South China Sea code of

conduct provide evidence that an alternative model is available.

Aircraft accidents during war exercises threaten Darwin residents

It's probably not the adage you're familiar with, but it's not every day an aircraft fuel tank weighing up to 450 kilograms falls from the sky.

An aircraft (believed to be US) was forced to dump the tank over Darwin on Monday during the first wave of flights for Pitch Black — one of the biggest international airforce exercises in the Southern Hemisphere — after running into trouble after take-off. Darwin is hosting 140 aircraft and 4,000 personnel from 16 countries in the three-week exercise.

In a Facebook post, Trey Branson said he was parked near the service station on Wishart Road when he saw "something pretty big" fall off a jet overhead. He said it looked like it dropped "very, very close" to PowerWater Corporation workers in the power yard substation behind the petrol station. The workers were "all staring towards where it landed ... [it] just missed them," Mr Branson wrote.

It's not the first time an aircraft has run into strife at Pitch Black; in 2000, investigators were left scratching their heads after a dummy missile fell from an FA18 Hornet onto a ute in Darwin. Basil Rowe's ute was destroyed by the falling object, prompting calls for air warfare exercises to be moved away from the city.

Several years ago a US aircraft accidently bombed the sleeping quarters of the RAAF at Tindal; fortunately there were no one in the quarters at the time.


