The Independent and Peaceful Australia Network (IPAN) opposesthisAgreementonthefollowinggrounds:

- 1. Such an important Agreement has been thrust on Parliament and the people of Australia with totally inadequate time for proper public and parliamentary consideration to be given to the implications of the Agreement. Four days to respond to such a critical agreement is an extremely inadequate response time.
- 2. Australian governments and people have for many years expressed ambitions for a world free of nuclear weapons...... The best way for Australia to move forward in the direction of a world free of nuclear weapons would be signing and ratifying and then subsequently adhering to the TPNW. This Exchange Agreement would be completely at variance with the spirit of the TPNW.
- 3. This Exchange Agreement is a step towards locking in place the decision for Australia to acquire nuclear powered

submarines when the government has advised that there will be an 18 month period to consider the way forward on new submarine acquisitions.

- 4. Building, operating and supporting (maintenance) of nuclear propelled submarines may lead to the establishment of a nuclear industry in Australia with the handling and danger issues associated with highly enriched, weapons-grade uranium and the disposal of associated radioactive waste. IPAN along with a large number of Australians oppose the development of a nuclear industry and nuclear reactors in Australia because of the dangers to the community which such an industry poses..... IPAN strongly supports keeping Australia nuclear free and indeed the Pacific area, of which we are a part, also nuclear-free.
- There is also a high level of community concern in relation to AUKUS, reflected in a national petition which received over 24,000 signatures - No Nuclear-Submarines; End U.S. dominance; Healthcare not warfare https://www.change.org/p/the-australian-government-nonuclear-submarines-end-u-s-dominance-healthcare-notwarfare
- 6. IPAN urges that this Exchange Agreement not be ratified by Parliament and that the 18-month period for consideration of the path forward in submarine acquisition be honoured before any such Agreement is given consideration, to allow proper democratic debate in the public and parliamentary domains.



Keating says Taiwan is "not a vital Australian interest" and Australia should not be involved in military engagement over Taiwan.

The first point is, Taiwan is not a vital Australian interest, let me repeat that, Taiwan is not a vital Australian interest. We have no alliance with Taipei, none. There is no document you can find. We do not recognise it as a sovereign state right? And under Anzus, Anzus commits us under an attack on US forces but not by US forces. We are committed under Anzus to an attack on US forces but not an attack by US forces which means Australia should not be drawn in my view into a military engagement over Taiwan, US sponsored or otherwise. As Xi Jinping said otherwise recently, we will try to resolve this harmoniously. He says the only time China attacks or gets involved with Taiwan is if the Americans and Taiwanese try to declare a change of status of Taiwan, and if it stays as is, then things will be harmonious.

Australians for War Powers Reform opposes AUKUS

On September 15 2021, with no public consultation, Australia entered into a trilateral security arrangement with Britain and the United States, known as the AUKUS Partnership. This is expected to become a Treaty in 2022......

Australians for War Powers Reform sees the public announcement of AUKUS as a smokescreen for other undertakings between Australia and the United States, the details of which are vague but which have major implications for Australia's security and Independence. Australia said the United States had requested increased use of Australian defence facilities. The US would like to base more bomber and escort aircraft in the north of Australia, presumably at Tindale. The US wants to increase the number of marines deployed in Darwin, which would see numbers rise to around 6,000. The US wants greater home porting of its vessels in Darwin and Fremantle, including nuclear-powered and armed submarines.... AUKUS will be detrimental to national security. The ADF will lose its capacity to act independently. Australians for War Power Reform believes these arrangements should not come into force, and that AUKUS should not become a Treaty.
