Winter Olympics thaws relations between North and South – this opportunity should not be lost



IPAN calls on the Australian Foreign Minister to publicly support North and South Korea engaging in joint talks to end the crisis.

Speaking on behalf of the Independent and Peaceful Australia Network (IPAN), Dr Alison Broinowski welcomed the more positive atmosphere between South and North Korea following the joint participation by athletes from both countries in the Winter Olympics.

"Direct talks between the leaders of South and North Korea provides the only hope to counteract the perils of the current stand-off over the North's nuclear weapons development."

"This initiative creates an opportunity to calm relations between South and North, and to set the stage for a resumption of the Six-Party negotiations involving both Koreas, Japan, USA, China and Russia. It also restores to the South a direct role in working towards peace in the Korean peninsula".

IPAN asks the Australian Government to support these moves and to add its weight to a resumption of the negotiation process.

"The Australian Government has the opportunity to remind its ally the USA, that Australians want to see a peaceful resolution to the conflict over nuclear weapons development, leading to a comprehensive outcome that takes into account the concerns of all involved" said Dr Broinowski.

Anti-nuclear campaigner awarded new peace prize





Giralang GP Dr Sue Wareham has been awarded the inaugural Chief Minister's Rotary Peace Prize at the unveiling of Canberra's first, and the nation's second only Peace Bell, at Canberra Nara Peace Park on the shores of Lake Burley Griffin. Dr Sue Wareham, one of the founders of the International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons (ICAN), said the award was an honour, not just for her but the causes she represented. She said Australia had been at war for 16 years and lamented that it had become the norm for Australia.

"We need to change that. Going to war should not be the thing that Australia is good at and the thing that Australians recognise as central to their

identity," Dr Wareham said. "There needs to be greater thought before we go to war, who's going to look after the victims, and what will be the outcomes." She called on Australia to rethink the policy of building an economy on war profiteering and having a vested interest in wars and instability.

IPAN's Give 'em the boot Campaign kicks off in Sydney and Newcastle



The campaign leaflet calling for the US Marines to be ousted from Darwin has hit 1,000 letterboxes in Erskinville in Sydney and 2,000 letterboxes in the Newcastle suburbs of Lambton, Hamilton, Rankin Park and Adamstown in the campaign "kick-off" late Feb. A total of 12 volunteer peace workers have been involved so far and their number is growing. Those receiving the leaflets have been asked to donate old boots and shoes to the campaign and these will be deposited at an appropriate government building at an appropriate time with a rally calling for the US Marines to be repatriated back to the US.

Sydney coordinator, Nick Deane, said recently: "There is an urgency about this campaign. If successful it will help Australia to break free of the US military and its war plans and help keep Australia out of US wars.".

The campaign leaflet says:

For Peace sake, the US marines must leave Darwin!

Did you know that, under a 25-year agreement, up to 2,500 armed US marines are routinely stationed in Darwin?

In 2011, the Gillard ALP government announced this without parliamentary or public debate. No plausible justification for the move has ever been provided.

The troops are kept in constant readiness for deployment at short notice, on a command from Washington. Their presence in Darwin means that **Australia's sovereign independencehas been jeopardised.**

The US troops are not here for our defence (the ADF is quite capable of defending Australia) - they are an attack force for maintaining US domination in the Asia-Pacific region.

These marines and the spy base at Pine Gap means that, in the event of war between the US and any one of its numerous enemies, Australia, as part of the US war machine, will be exposed to the threat of a retaliatory attack. It is costing the Australian tax payer a significant proportion of the stated \$2-

3 billion necessary to establish this US military presence in Australia, plus additional, annual maintenance

costs. This money would be better spent on pressing social needs such as housing, health care, education and aged care.

IPAN National Campaign – Don't Buy Into War

So a nuclear arms race between the US and Russia is escalating; economic rivalry between China and US intensifies, and the US at least seems to be itching to turn it into military confrontation; the situation on the Korean peninsula remains very tense, with US threats of 'limited' nuclear attack still on the table; and fierce armed conflict still raging in Syria, the Yemen, various parts of Africa and endlessly of course in Afghanistan.

So what does our government do to calm the situation, to douse the flames of war to the extent it can? It announces \$3.8 billion dollars will be available to turn Australia into one of the world's major arms manufacturers and exporters. It intends to douse the flames of war with petrol.

If any industry globally has dark and unsavoury reputation, it is that of the "Masters of War". The low-interest loans policy will undoubtedly go mainly to global (mainly US) transnational arms corporations already well established in Australia – such as Lockheed Martin, Boeing, Raytheon, Airbus and BAE Systems. And despite the usual empty rhetoric about a careful vetting of

customers, Australia is already trading with such paragons of international virtue as Saudi Arabia and Israel. Jobs growth is an illusion – subsidising renewable energy, health, transport or education would yield far better and more productive jobs at much less cost.

As a result, IPAN has adopted as one of its two major and ongoing national campaigns "Don't Buy Into War". This will not only oppose government (federal AND state) export aims; but also the major increases in Australian military spending already announced, which are much more about interoperability with US global belligerence (with all the attendant risks) than about any genuine Australian defence policy. To do so, we intend to cooperate with a broad range of Australian people and organisations already opposing and campaigning against this death trade.

Stop Defence poisoning us

So reads the sign on a ribbon tied to the fence at the entrance to the RAAF base Williamtown, NSW.

It marks two years of red zone contamination in a large area, including residential and farmland areas, in the vicinity of this air-force base. Freedom of information documents show that the Department of Defence found peri- & polyfluoroalkyl chemicals (PFA's) 30 times above acceptable levels one km away from the air-force base and that this was known in 2012, 3 years before the public were alerted in September, 2015. A red zone area covering many hectares has been declared and residents within the red zone advised not to drink ground water or eat vegetables grown in this area as the contaminants which have leached out of the base are associated with a variety of cancers. NSW EPA has suspended fishing in nearby waters. The Williamtown and Surrounds Resident Action Group is fighting to have the cancerous pollution stopped and the area cleaned up and wants made public a thorough impact statement addressing this distressing and dangerous contamination issue. Nothing has been said publicly as yet about the possible contamination of Newcastle's drinking water which is fed from the reservoir adjacent to the RAAF Base.

Plan to increase defence exports at odds with our peacekeeping role

The latest plank in the government's "jobs and growth" strategy - to turn Australia into one of the world's 10 biggest defence exporters in the next decade - takes the country down a path that is fundamentally at odds with our nation's values.

We have long pictured ourselves as a leader in our region, maintaining peace and a rules-based international order. From myriad projects supporting democracy, to our peacekeeping missions in the Solomon Islands, Timor-Leste and further afield, promoting peace and stability is a mission at the core of our Australian identity.

But the \$3.8 billion defence export strategy announced by Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull at the end of January puts our role as a peacekeeping nation at risk.

Militarisation of SA Schools

Initially 3 SA schools were announced as piloting the defence schools programme in 2010 by the Federal government. These were Aberfoyle Park (which Raytheon was a partner), Henley High School and Valley View with St Patricks Technical school chosen to have a defence focus pathway. Several defence companies including Raytheon, contributed to the Ignite programme for gifted students in maths and science. In return Raytheon and other defence industry manufacturers scientists and engineers could have access to students who could be 'mentored' into a career in the weapons industry. The aim of the then \$10.9 million National Partnerships Agreement was to prepare students to work in the defence industry and military. This funding could have offered real futures in developing environmental sciences and broader skills in more constructive and sustainable development.

An attack on North Korea could start a US-China war

Following the Winter Olympics, South Korean President Moon Jaein <u>indicated</u> he was ready to talk to North Korea and engage in diplomacy. And while Vice President Mike Pence – who earlier announced severe sanctions on the North –first signaled a willingness to talk, he quickly seemed to change course.

President Trump further indicated that he is considering a preventive military strike on the North if the sanctions failed to denuclearize the communist nation. But such a so-called "bloody nose" strike against North Korean missile sites and nuclear facilities stands an excellent chance of becoming a bloody disaster.

China won't tolerate an unprovoked attack on North Korea, and President Moon will not support the use of South Korean forces as part of a U.S. military strike against North Korea.

A war with North Korea could result in about 10,000 American combatrelated casualties in the first few days alone, according to US military planners.

A classified military exercise last week, attended by Army chief of staff General Mark Milley and head of Special Operations Command General Tony Thomas, tested hypothetical scenarios of how US troops would mobilise and strike if ordered to into a potential war, reported the New York Times.

The "tabletop exercise", held over a few days in Hawaii, thrashed out the challenges that could hamper a US assault on North Korea's sizeable military.

Civilian casualties would far outweigh the initial toll on US troops, and could potentially reach hundreds of thousands, commanders were told.

While the US stations about 28,500 troops in South Korea, the capital, Seoul, a city of about 24 million, lies within range of the formidable firepower of North Korea's artillery stationed along the border.

The potential human costs of any war were so high that, at one point in the exercise, General Milley remarked that "the brutality of this will be beyond the experience of any living soldier" said the Times.



Today, 1 March, is Nuclear Free and Independent Pacific Day - the 64th anniversary of the 'Bravo' nuclear bomb detonation by the United States close to the surface of Bikini Atoll, in the Marshall Islands, which blasted out a crater more than 200 feet deep and a mile across.

Particles of radioactive fallout from the blast landed on the island of Rongelap (100 miles away) to a depth of one and a half inches in places, and radioactive mist appeared on Utirik (300 miles away). The US navy did not send ships to evacuate the people of Rongelap and Utirik until three days after the explosion. Fallout from this one nuclear weapon detonation spread over more than 7,000 square miles, and traces were detected throughout the Pacific, in India, Japan, the United States and Europe. The Marshallese, and other Pacific peoples subjected to more than 350 full scale nuclear weapon detonations in the Pacific - conducted by Britain, France and the US - were used as human guinea pigs in an obscene experiment to 'progress' the insane pursuit of nuclear weapons supremacy.

Nuclear Free and Independent Pacific Day is a day to remember that the arrogant colonial mindset which allowed, indeed encouraged, the horror outlined above continues today - the Pacific remains neither nuclear free nor independent.






