Glimmer of hope early in 2018

Peace organisations including IPAN will see a glimmer of hope on the Korean Peninsula with talks between North Korea and South Korea commencing this month. Whilst these talks centre on North Korea participating in the Winter Olympics in South Korea and the teams of both countries marching together at the games, there is also talk of family reunions across the border during the Games. The South Koreans have also expressed interest in discussing with North Korea its nuclear program. These talks have side-lined the United States whose belligerence has exacerbated tensions on the peninsula. Indeed as IPAN has pointed out on several occasions, the presence of U.S. troops and their Thaad missile defence systems in South Korea together with the war exercises it carries out together with South Korean, Australian and Japanese military forces is provocative and not conducive to either peace talks or a peace treaty. The latter matter has been left unresolved since the Korean war of the 1950's.

IPAN has urged the PM, Malcom Turnbull, and Foreign Affairs Minister, Julie Bishop, to charter a foreign affairs policy which is independent of the United States and to seek talks with North Korea and possibly the reopening of an Australian Embassy in Pyongyang.

Unfortunately, to date, the Australian Government has dutifully followed the U.S. by joining their military together with those of South Korea and Japan in these provocative war exercises on the Korean peninsula. Australian warships together with those of the U.S. are deployed in Korean waters and South Korean ports despite protests from South Koreans such as those on Jeju Island. IPAN in 2018 will continue to urge the Australian Government to put the interests of peace and the Australian and Korean people first and seek peaceful solutions to conflict in our region, stepping away from its past blind-following of the United States' war policies.

Report from Jeju Island, South Korea:

Steady Onslaught of Foreign Warships at the 'Island of Peace' including U.S. and Australian warships

On Sept. 26 the USS Chief, a mine countermeasures ship, entered the Jeju Navy Base, followed by the US Aegis destroyer Mustin on Oct. 21. Then came Australian warships HMAS Melbourne and HMAS Parramatta on Nov. 3. And then nuclear submarine USS Mississippi arrived on Nov. 22 staying in the base for six days until it left on Nov. 27. None of these ships' arrivals were informed in advance to the island people. Nine foreign warships have docked in the Jeju navy base so far this year, suggesting that the base was indeed built for American use.

The USS Mississippi visit is ominous of further nuclear cooperation between the two countries, threatening not only the environment but also the prospects for the peaceful unification of Korea, as nuclear submarines are a violation of the 1992 Joint Declaration made by North and South Korea for the denuclearization of the peninsula. Jeju is preparing for the 70th anniversary of the 4-3 Uprising and the US-sponsored massacre of Jeju people by Korean troops and paramilitaries.

For the eventual realization of Jeju as a true Island of Peace, we demand the closing of the Jeju navy base, an end to war exercises, and for the demilitarization of Jeju.

Increased military exercises between Australian
& South Korean troops on the Korean Peninsula
heightens tensions;

In early October Australian Defence Minister Marise Payne announced the intention to 'increase military training exercises' with the ROK. (1) The upgraded diplomatic relations rested upon a 2015 agreement, Blueprint for Defence and Security Cooperation, for joint military exercises. (2)

The proposed Exercise Haedoli Wallaby off the Korean peninsula are due to commence next month and include two ADF warships, the Melbourne and the Parramatta, together with a P-8A submarine hunter aircraft. (3)

The military exercises form part of a US-led aggressive regional foreign policy. While it has been primarily concerned with the northern DPRK, its main purpose is an attempt to encircle and contain China as a major rising regional force. With heightening diplomatic tensions becoming commonplace, western observers have recently even stopped denying the main purpose of the militarism.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The Australian government should immediately:

- give notice of the end of the deployment of US troops in Darwin;
- give notice that no information from the Pine Gap Joint Defence

Facility is to be conveyed to the US to be used in the drone assassination program;

- give notice of a review of the functions of Pine Gap;
- · sign the UN Treaty to Prohibit Nuclear Weapons;

- · legislate to adopt war powers reform, making Australian Parliament agreement to the deployment of troops mandatory;
- stop the policy of refugee boat turn-backs and bring the refugees on Manus Island and Nauru to Australia. Work with Indonesia and Sri Lanka to increase timely processing of claims and increase the number of refugees from those countries given asylum in Australia and other third countries:
- adopt a rigorous program of greenhouse gas emission reductions, including halting any new coal mines and expansion of any existing coal mines, and develop a transition from fossil fuels program for the workforces affected;
- adopt a rigorous program for support of renewable energy technologies;
- double our international aid program and commit to moving to achieving the UN goal of 0.7% of GNI for the aid program;
- double our education assistance in the aid program from \$50m to \$100m pa and increase by 20 times, the number of students supported to study in Australia from PNG as well as increasing numbers from Timor-Leste and Indonesia;
- halt free-trips being provided to members of parliament or journalists
 by any foreign country;
- commit to complying with UN conventions to which we are a signatory and criticizing human rights abuses wherever they occur. For IPAN's complete response, <u>READ ON</u>

US President stirs up conflict over Jerusalem during the festive season



UNITED NATIONS 21st December, 2017-- The United Nations General Assembly voted Thursday on a resolution condemning President Trump's new policy recognizing Jerusalem as the capital of Israel. The General Assembly voted 128-9, with 35 abstentions, to declare Mr. Trump's declaration of Jerusalem as the capital "null and void."

Mr. Trump said he'd be watching very closely at which members of the General Assembly vote for the resolution and which vote against it.

The resolution stated that any decision to change the status of Jerusalem is null and void, has no legal effect, and that it must be rescinded. It also called on member countries not to set up diplomatic missions in Jerusalem.

Figures released today by the Australian National Audit Office indicate that the Australian Defence Force has spent more than \$10 billion on weapons and military equipment from the United States over the past four years.
